It may be hard to believe that a little paper such as Our Parish Times could scoop The Washington Post but, it did so and by almost three years.

The story was Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia's opinion that religious faith is constantly belittled by the "wordly wise" in a secular society. His April speech at the First Baptist Church in Jackson, Miss., quickly reported with an alarming headline by The Post ("...Justice Proclaims Belief In Miracles), was, with its explanation of the word "cretin" almost identical in content to the address he gave in a rare public appearance at a banquet in 1993.

That speech could have been news in The Washington Post the following morning and by the end of the week, columnists in fear and loathing of Christianity could have written, "No, we are not against religion so, there!". In fact, The Washington Post, along with The Washington Times and other local media, were invited to cover what was not only a very rare but sure to be a very revealing appearance by an aloof public figure. They did not, however, send anybody. Joe Siccardi, then-editor of The Catholic Standard wanted to send areporter but was unable to so, the OPT

man did double duty that night.

I'm sure that the secular papers didn't attend because the event at which Scalia spoke was "a Catholic show," a positive thing concerning the Church.

The only Catholics covered are "the former altar boys" who blow their roommates away with a twelve-gauge or the priests and teachers who dissent from Church teaching.
